Development application guidelines

Landscape plan and details

What is the purpose of this?	A <i>landscape plan and details</i> illustrates the existing vegetation to be retained, the proposed landscaping, materials and features, and detail drawings demonstrating installation.
Who should prepare this?	A <i>landscape plan and details</i> should be prepared by a qualified landscape or horticultural professional. The level of qualification required is dependent on the size and/or complexity of the development proposal and design team composition, which will be discussed and determined at the time of the pre-consultation meeting.
When is this required?	 A <i>landscape plan and details</i> may be required as part of an application for: Zoning By-law Amendment (conceptual landscape plan only) Plan of Subdivision Site Plan Control
Why do we need this?	A <i>landscape plan and details</i> are required to demonstrate a proposed development's conformity with the applicable policies of the Official Plans, regulations of the Zoning By-laws and adherence to all relevant urban design guidelines and standards.
How should this be prepared?	 Depending on the size or complexity of the development proposal, a <i>landscape plan and details</i> may be a stand-alone drawing, or the information may be included on a site plan. In either case, the following information is required: the location and description (e.g. type, material, size, height) of: all existing natural features, including top-of-bank and watercourses existing vegetation to be retained or removed landscape buffers and screening protection measures for the existing vegetation to be retained all proposed plant material, planting beds and sodded areas all hard surfaced areas (e.g. driveways, walkways, parking areas, curbing, patios and plazas) all fences, screen walls and retaining walls, including height and materials stormwater management landscape features above and below ground utilities, including lighting standards/features refuse storage and collection facilities, including screening features snow storage facilities a detailed plant list itemizing botanical name, common name, quantity, size, condition, and spacing of all proposed plant material proposed grades, finished first floor elevations, existing grades along the property lines and elevations at the base of retained existing trees



What else should we know?	Recommend reviewing the specific requirements of your application and proposed landscaping with an Urban Designer in the Planning Services Department.
