- Style: Arts & Crafts with shingle style influences
- o Cross gable and gambrel roofs
- One-and-a-half changing to two-and-a-half storeys due to grade change

- Asymmetrical facades. The front façade includes two entryways, both recessed in covered porches, supported by flared porch columns. Inset shed dormers. South façade includes a two-storey verandah.
- A variety of shapes and sizes of windows, including six-over-one, multi-pane casements and/or multi-pane fixed sash.

Historical Description:

- Summer home of Edwyn and Marie (nee Cavers) Langmuir, constructed in 1907. Edwyn was the Secretary Treasurer of a Leather Goods Company and the family's principal residence was in Toronto.
- Community research indicates that the property was sold to Richard Baines of Toronto in 1921 and used as a summer home. Baines was co-founder of Baines and David, an iron and steel warehousing firm.
- Called "Point O' View" by the Lind family, who owned the home by 1953. Plum (nee Lind) Johnson explained that the plaque which read "Alexander U. Lind "Slave Driver" Circa 1953" was installed by she and her four brothers, and poked fun at her father British Navy Lieutenant, Alexander Lind. Some of Mr. Lind's war time experiences were captured in Ian Skidmore's book, "Escaping from the Rising Sun: The Incredible Journey of the Sederhana Djohnais". Memorialized by former resident, Plum Johnson, in her book "They Left Us Everything".

Historical Description:

- o Community research indicates that this property changed hands between William Chisholm, Justice Williams and Joseph Boone until it was sold to Henry Chadwick Scholfield in 1909.
- The home was built in 1910 for Scholfield's mother-in-law Maria Sutherland and two of her daughters, Irene & Grace. Maria Sutherland was the widow of Dr. Thomas Sutherland who began his medical career in Simcoe County and relocated to Oakville in 1864. He died in 1890. The family were active members of St. Jude's Church. Maria died in 1920 and in 1921 Henry Scholfield formally granted the property to Irene & Grace.
- o In 1936, with the passing of Irene the property was purchased by Gordon Stewart Gooderham, the great grandson of Wiliam Gooderham who founded "Gooderham & Worts".
